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Chairman's Remarks

Welcome to the annual report of Bridging the Gap

It is a great pleasure to be writing in the Annual Report of Bridging the Gap 10 years on from its beginning. It was conceived in a conversation I had with Brian McGrath who was then the Parish Priest at Blessed John Duns Scotus. How could we find a way to demonstrate that our congregations, in an area with a history of sectarian divide, are now committed together to making a real difference to lives in our community based on need and not on background allegiance?

Today Bridging the Gap has a proud track record in making a real difference. Children who were at the start of their school journey 10 years ago have been assisted in their transition from primary to secondary school are now Peer Tutors passing on their experience to others.

People who arrived in Gorbals as Asylum Seekers with no English and suffering the effects of traumatic change now converse with ease and have moved on into education, voluntary work and employment.

As an organisation, Bridging the Gap has also matured and was a key player in the structure and development of the Gorbals Integration Network. It is also highly valued by schools who are our partners in supporting Gorbals children.

As a small charity within the voluntary sector we face considerable challenges. Planning and funding frameworks rightly demand good information on which to base their decisions and so our most recent staff post contains a monitoring and evaluation aspect to its work. The need to sustain work in the longer term within a diverse cocktail of funding continues to be a challenge, and this has proved to be an important aspect of the professional development of our staff team, who have contributed hugely to the achievements of the past year in developing finance.

Following a period of uncertainty in the wake of an unsuccessful Lottery bid, Bridging the Gap has recovered well and we look forward now to developing new ways of achieving our objectives as well as continuing the very high quality of work that we are already doing. None of this would be possible without the hard work of our staff and volunteer board members, to whom we express our gratitude, especially to those who have moved on in the course of the past year.

Co-ordinator's Report

It's been a very challenging year for Bridging the Gap. Despite some sad moments we're glad to say we have had some happy endings.

We got to a low point in our funding where we unfortunately had to let two members of staff go. Despite this and due to the hard work and commitment of the remaining staff we still managed to reach our targets and more importantly make a difference in the Gorbals.

On the Integration side we are delighted this year that more local Scottish folk have got involved. One local man who came to the Gorbals Fair and then to Bridging the Gap's Christmas celebrations said "I never knew this place was here, it's fantastic. It makes you realise there's a community within a community and I am really proud to be part of it".

It has also been great to be able to assist those Asylum Seekers who got positive decisions to move on with their lives. To see them relax and grasp the new opportunities open to them and finally becoming equal citizens.

Having more direct involvement in the schools this year, I have witnessed at first hand the difference Bridging the Gap makes to young people. On their first visit to Holyrood Secondary school, Five Primary 7 girls were so shy they walked behind each other keeping close to the corridor wall with their heads down. After a few weeks of Peer tutoring these 5 youngsters charged down the same corridor and felt able to approach teachers and introduce themselves. One woman who volunteered with both sides of the organisation and recently left to go to college said "I used to be really guiet but through volunteering at Bridging the Gap I have got more confident and have come out of my shell".

It's hard to choose only two examples from so many in 07/08. (Read on for fuller accounts of our work)

Meeting this year's challenges has made Bridging the Gap a stronger, tighter and more robust organisation. We have been fortunate to get a degree of funding which secures some areas of the organisation for the next three years.

As Co-ordinator I would like to say that this wouldn't have been possible without the flexibility, extra hours, commitment and passion of the staff team which I feel privileged to be part of.

I would like to thank the Board the Directors and the funders for their support and belief in our work. I would also like to thank the organisations that have partnered us in joint projects, our volunteers and the local churches and congregation for their continuing support.

Schools Team Report

In 2007-08 we continued our work with local schools in the following areas; Peer Tutoring, Citizenship and community building, anti-sectarian initiatives and other curriculum based group work as part of the Scottish Government's 'More Choices, More Chances' strategy. Fundraising once again proved to be a challenge for us, however we were successful in securing a new stream of funding from The Paul Hamlyn Foundation and The Moffat Trust as well as receiving continued support from existing funders.

PEER TUTORING

A major "gap" is between Primary and Secondary school. Our peer-tutoring programme gives vulnerable young people in the last year of Primary school the opportunity to prepare for the transition to Secondary school.

Building positive relationships with older pupils, feeling comfortable in the Secondary school building and getting to meet their new teachers enables the young people to become more confident and relaxed about starting Secondary school.

In our peer-tutoring programme we continued to work with Blackfriars and St.Francis Primary Schools in Gorbals, St Brigid's Primary in Toryglen and Holy Cross Primary in Govanhill as well as both Secondary Schools, Holyrood and Shawlands Academy.

This has been a successful year in terms of numbers taking part - in total we had 91 young people complete the programme.

Each year we hold an Awards Ceremony to celebrate the achievements of all young people involved. This years was held at Hampden Park – Scotland's National Stadium, a / got fitting venue for the participants. Around 300 people heard speeches from Frank McAveety MSP, Councillor Anne Marie Millar and Councillor Gordon Matheson in his role as Executive member for

Education and Social Renewal. We also had guests from 'River City' to present the young people with their certificates.

Feedback from parents and young people was extremely positive.

CITIZENSHIP

Our citizenship and community-building programme aims to engage with young people and raise their awareness of their rights and responsibilities as young citizens.

In partnership with The Iona Community we delivered workshops to pupils on the theme of citizenship. These mainly focussed on Sectarianism. Through discussion, drama and groupwork we looked at stereotypes and prejudices in more detail with 2 groups of S3 pupils from Holyrood Secondary



The foundation of our schools work is to provide opportunities for young people to meet and learn together.

As part of our peer-tutoring programme the S4 pupils from both Holyrood and Shawlands went together to the Corrymeela Centre in Ballycastle, Co. Antrim, Northern Ireland. During this weekend the young people met other young

> people from one of our partners - The East Belfast Area Youth Project. Bridging the Gap and Corrymeela staff delivered a programme that

> > included team building and discussion based activities around themes of prejudice and

sectarianism.

WAY AHEAD GROUP

Young people who are, or are at risk of being, not in education, employment or training and at risk of becoming socially excluded are a priority for the Scottish Government.

One of the Secondary Schools we work with, identified a group of S3s and asked Bridging the Gap along with other agencies such as GSERA and Social Work Department to deliver a programme of Personal, Social and Vocational Development (PSD) to this group during class time. During this programme, we delivered a personal development programme - Go For It - which aims to give young people the thinking skills they need to make the improvements they want in their lives enabling them

to become self-motivated, lifelong learners. This is the second group we have worked with and will continue to work with them in their 4th year at school also. The first group we worked with successfully received an Intermediate 1 qualification in PSD.




